NATIONAL IFYE CONFERENCE JUNE 23-27

Minnesota alumni beckon you to St. Paul, June 23-27, 2004, for a great program of education, entertainment and fellowship. Bring your family and friends.

Flags and hands will be waving in celebration of your arrival at the conference headquarters - the Holiday Inn St. Paul East!

The conference will begin with a welcoming festival of creativity and international dancing. A "Spirit of IFYE" exhibit will feature photos you bring that emphasize your international experience.

Bring your favorite 5x7 or 8x10 black and white or color photograph - not slides. Label the back with your name and address. They will be returned at the end of the conference.

Conferees will be entertained and enlightened by special guest speakers highlighting the conference theme, "Waves of Today." On the first day, they'll enjoy a Minnesota hot-dish supper and Scandinavian music.

A conference highlight will be the opportunity to learn of the different waves that have shaped Minnesota through Friday tours that focus on Waves of History, Waves of Grain, Waves of Flowers and Plants, Waves of Swedish Immigrants, and Waves of Tourists ...the choice of tour is yours! There will be plenty of free time to pursue individual interests on Saturday.

The special International Banquet and program on Saturday evening will still leave a few hours for rest before the Sunday morning worship service, closing ceremony, and farewell brunch.

A children's program, appropriate to the ages and numbers of those attending, will be provided. Camping facilities are available within ten miles of the conference headquarters.

The conference service project will support Operation Bootstrap Africa, a program dedicated to providing primary school education for children in Tanzania. School bags will be prepared during the conference. Bring spiral notebooks, lined notebook paper,

16-24-pack crayons, rulers, erasers, scissors, pencils, pens, colored markers/pencils, and pencil sharpeners. Cash donations will also be welcome to round out the needs of the project.

St. Paul is the destination of Grand Excursion 2004, a replication of Grand Excursion 1854 that celebrated America's first railroad connection to the Mississippi River. President Fillmore traveled by rail from Chicago to Rock Island, Illinois, then by steamboat up river to St. Paul and Saint Anthony Falls in Minneapolis. Events are planned from June 25 to July 4 in Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota to retrace this journey (www.grandexcursion.

#### Update on 4-H **International Programs** Reflections on Sri Lanka Visit

Happy New Year!

It has been my privilege to serve as president of the IFYE Association - first in 1963-64 and during the past three years. Your new president, David White, CA-Philippines 1979, and the entire board, have my full support. I look forward to a final year on the board as past president, continuing as editor of IFYE News, and coordinating the alumni directory and historical records.

Our new year began with travel to Sri Lanka to visit our son, Dean, MD-Egypt/Israel 1986, his wife, Jane, OH-Israel/Netherlands 86/ 88, and our three grand-redheads! Dean is the economics officer with our Embassy in Colombo, which serves both Sri Lanka and The Maldives. More on Sri Lanka later.

This past year was a challenge following the National 4-H Headquarters decision that there would not be national coordination of 4-H International exchanges. Very few states participated in 2003. It appears that most states are waiting until there is a decision as to how programs are going to be coordinated nationally. However, U.S. participation has been minimal the last several years.

In reference to the whole exchange effort and concerns of the 4-H Program, we also face the challenge of fewer countries with 4-H-like programs, safety, security and visa issues, and CSIET (Council on Standards for International

Education Travel) guidelines.

Other countries are also evaluating their programs. Costa Rica 4-S and Norway 4H are not participating this year as they go through an evaluation similar to ours.

We hope the U.S. evaluation, still underway, and the recommendations of the National 4-H Leadership Trust, will provide a renewal of enthusiasm and commitment for these programs. I hope State Extension/4-H programs, National 4-H Headquarters, National 4-H Council and the National 4-H Leadership Trust place high importance on international relationships and the world community and make them the top priority they should be.

4-H is a grass-roots organization. Programs must have support at the local and state levels. This is where alumni can help. Make your feelings known to your Extension staff and support your state with financial and volunteer assistance.

Back to Sri Lanka. While there. I visited the Young Farmers Club (YFC) program, with which we had many successful exchanges in past years. I met current and former staff. They also asked for any help we can provide YFC, including reinstatement of exchange/training programs. Sri Lanka has been through some challenging years due to internal political conflict hopefully a thing of the past as of two years ago.

A personal note. When with a U.N. project in Sri Lanka in 1990, I had the opportunity to visit a new organization, Samata Sarana (SS), working with the poorest of the poor on the streets, along the coast





and in the shanty towns. When I met the director, Sister Bernie Silva, I knew it would be a success. I introduced her to USAID. Funding eventually became available to assist with a facility for offices, training and housing. SS now provides meals, basic education and training for 500 young people and adults, delivers 2000 meals to families six evenings a week, and houses 50 young people from around the country. Financial support comes from around the world.

## Celebrating 55+ Years of 4-H International Exchanges/Assistance To Youth Programs



55+ Celebration - Despite wintry weather, 4-H International alumni and friends in the national capital area celebrated 55+ years of 4-H International exchanges and assistance to youth programs around the world at the National 4-H Center in early December. The IFYE Association board of directors, meeting in Washington at the time, and others from around the country joined in the celebration. Weather did keep some alumni and friends from neighboring states from attending.

4-H Citizenship and International programs have been a part of 4-H since the early 1900s. 2003 was the 55th Anniversary year of IFYE, the first 4-H International exchange program. 1948 is considered the year 4-H Interntional exchanges began. However, they actually started a year earlier, though the IFYE logo had not yet been introduced - when a group from Europe came to the U.S. A.G. Kettunen, state 4-H leader in Michigan, 1920s -1956, often pointed out that 4-H was emphasizing citizenship from it's beginning and 4-H International relationships began as early as the 1920's when some Extension staff were helping countries organize programs similar to 4-H. Kettunen, of Finnish ancestry, personally assisted in the founding of 4-H in Finland. Thus, a "55+" Anniversary Celebration!

Following dinner and the 55+ anniversary dessert, attendees introductions brought memorable and humorous reflections on their participation over the years. Mel Thompson, IFYE Association president, shared an update on the Association and reported on the status of the current exchange programs and the work of the National Task Force on 4-H International Programs. Stan Dreyer, IFYE Foundation president, reported on Foundation activity and the 2004 fund-raising campaign.

In my estimation, there are issues that need to be addressed now to ensure the smooth operation of the Board and the Association. There are also items I would like all of you to consider as well. Some of the suggestions will mean changing the way we do things.

Owing to several amendments in the past 20 years, the By-Laws of the Association are in need of revision. I will ask a committee of past and present members of the Board to review and revise the document. The much needed face lift will eliminate contradictory articles and the circular nature of its current form. It is vitally important that the guidelines set forth in the By-Laws work for the Association and not the other way

Current plans call for the Board to meet via conference call once every month or two. With these teleconferences will be an opportunity for members to exchange ideas with the Board in an open forum once reserved for annual conferences.

Of concern to me is making sure we grow our membership. Economic times have caused Extension budgets across the nation to dwindle. The result is a more focused effort by 4-H agents to pick and choose conferences that provide them with the opportunity to teach or learn. The days of healthy travel budgets are gone. If we are not able to engage the minds and bodies of agents, we will not prosper in our efforts to promote international education and recruitment of outbound Representatives. There must be a compelling reason for 4-H agents

and administrators to attend the yearly gathering. What I am suggesting is that future national and world IFYE conferences give equal consideration to scholarship and social interaction.

I have several questions with few answers. I believe they are worthy of exploration. Can we redefine the role of the IFYE or the international experience? As you look back, what was your role? Were you expected to teach? Were you expected to help initiate or support a system of positive youth development?

Could IFYE's have a more defined role in their outbound experience? Could 4-H agents devote three months to a Representative outbound experience to enhance or initiate positive youth development programs? Could our post 4-H recruits serve as Ambassador/Interns to assist the Representative/Agent?

A final thought. What does the IFYE Association mean to you? What are your expectations? The society we live in today is one that expects a return for a dollar invested. What benefits does membership in the Association provide?

Please think about these questions and don't hesitate to contact me with your opinions or comments. I look forward to a productive and positive year.

I also speak for the Board and the membership when I express heart felt gratitude and appreciation for the service and leadership Mel Thompson has provided this Association. On their behalf - our thanks!

### Gary L. Heusel's Retirement Lasted Three Weeks

#### Helped Develop Armenia Rural Youth Program

Armenia Rural Youth

Gary Heusel retired from his position as state 4-H leader in Nebraska last spring and three weeks later was in Armenia. He is part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Marketing Assistance Project to help with the further development and strengthening of Armenia's rural

youth program, modeled after 4-H in the U.S.

The program has been implemented in all ten regions of the country and Yerevan, the country's capital

area, since it began in 1997. There are currently over 125 clubs with over 2100 members between the ages of 11 to 18.

As was the case with 4-H in the early years, Heusel points out, "Armenian young people are helping adults with whom they work recognize the value of making changes, learning how to

be more productive and market what is produced." They use drama, skits, role-playing, music and dance to get the attention of audiences and stimulate learning.

Supplementing formal school education, the Armenian program provides an opportunity for youth

to gain life-skills through project development, basic agricultural knowledge, community development activities, and citizenship and leadership training.

Annual programs include summer

training camps, a small mini-grants project, public youth speaking and writing competition, professional orientation tours, partnership projects and publication of technical booklets for youth.

Last summer, Heusel and three Armenian young people traveled to Helsinki, Finland, for a leadership training program, sponsored by the

Society for Organizational Learning (SOL) Youth and Education Network. Contributions through the IFYE Association and the IFYE Foundation helped make this possible.

Jeff Miller, OH-New Zealand 1987, president of Innovative Leadership Solutions and a member of SOL, assisted with the Finland training and later traveled to Armenia to


consult with Heusel and the Armenian staff. Miller was the consultant/facilitator for the Futuring Conference on 4-H International Programs, sponsored by the IFYE Association in the spring of 2002.

#### The Legacy Continues

2003 was the beginning of a major transition for 4-H International exchanges. Following coordination of state/country connections at the national level, states worked directly with participating countries. This was facilitated by a high interest in some states to continue programs; the facilitating role for state/country connections; significant volunteer effort provided by alumni for orientation and assistance to state 4-H staff; and very important financial support where needed through contributions to the IFYE Foundation. Without one of these a successful transition would not have happened.

The Foundation provided \$10,200 for programming costs; \$2,476 for participant insurance and \$638 for miscellaneous operating costs. Fortunately the program will continue in 2004 following a successful effort in 2003. We thank one and all for the continued support and faith in the program.

#### **Friday Tour Options**

Waves of History (#1) Tour sites of St. Paul's dark underworld during its roaring hoodlum heyday, where gangsters lived it up and committed some of the most notorious crimes in the Upper Midwest. You'll visit the site of the Swift payroll robbery, the Dillinger shoot-out with the FBI, the kidnapping of the Hamm Brewery heir and more. You will learn of the corrupt agreement between politicians, the St. Paul Police Department and underworld leaders who claimed they ran the city of St. Paul in the 1920s and 30s. You'll have a guided tour of Landmark Center - the former Federal Courts Building - where the criminal trials of many notoriously shady characters were held. Today Landmark Center is the cultural center of downtown St. Paul, housing 15 visual, music and theater groups. Lunch at the Minnesota History Center and see where Minnesota stories have been collected, preserved and told for more than 150 years.

**Waves of Grain (#2)** It's Flour and Flowers in Minneapolis, and a little Swedish influence as well! Visit Minnehaha Falls and nearby gardens, and the Mill City Museum, on the site of what once was the centerpiece of the Minneapolis flour-milling empire. After a guided tour you'll have time to explore the Flour Tower elevator trip to the top of the mill, the baking lab, the water lab and numerous main-gallery exhibits. After lunch tour downtown Minneapolis to see the skyway system and the Mary Tyler Moore statue, then travel through Theodore Wirth Park and around the lakes. As time permits we will see the famous rose garden and Peace Garden, or drive by Mary Tyler Moore's home from the TV show. Last stop will be the American Swedish Institute in the elegant Tumblad Mansion, which pays tribute to more than 150 years of Swedish experience in America. Returning to the hotel, you pass the Governor's mansion and the St. Paul Cathedral.

**Waves of Flowers and Plants (#3)** Names one of the "10 great places to smell the flowers" by USA Today and a world-renown cold-climate arboretum, the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum boasts 1,030 acres, 32 specialty gardens, 48 plant collections and more than 5,000 plant varieties. A one-hour tram tour will encompass the 3-Mile drive through the groups. Lunch in the Anderson Building housing the library, conservatory, tearoom and gift shop. The day includes a stop at the Horticulture Research Center, where the world-famous Honeycrisp apple was developed.

**Wave of Swedish Immigrants (#4)** You will follow the path and story of Swedish immigrants to Minnesota as told by Vilhelm Moberg in his trilogy "The Immigrants," "Unto a Good Land," and "The Settlers" - good books to read before the conference. In Chisago City/Lindstrom you'll see the home where Moberg stayed and statues of the main characters, Karl Oscar and Kristina. You will visit the original Lutheran Church (part of the story), Taylors Falls on the St. Croix River and Franconia Landing, where early settlers disembarked from river boats to trek to their land. Gammel Garden at Scandia and lunch at the second oldest Lutheran Church in Minnesota will be a real treat. And you'll have time for antiquing, sightseeing and shopping at Stillwater, a lumber-town locale for early Swedish immigrants.

**Waves of Tourists (#5)** A full day to shop at the Mall of America, the largest indoor retail and family entertainment center in the U.S. With 10 minutes in each store you'd need 86 hours. Camp Snoopy, the nation's largest indoor family theme park, has more than 30 rides and 7 acres of fun. The four-story Lego showplace, for all ages, contains Lego bricks to play with models to view and sets to buy. There is state-of-the-art bowling, underwater adventure at Minnesota's largest aquarium, and the NASCAR Silicon Motor Speedway, a high-tech indoor stock car racing competition. The Mall has more than 50 full-service eateries a lunch youcher comes with the tour.
